The summer of 2012 will not go down as a great one for the UK. However the swallows that arrive each year and nest in our stables have had a bumper year. From five nests the swallows have managed to raise a total of 19 chicks from birth to adulthood. Sadly the final clutch of chicks was abandoned, leaving three chicks to die and a very lightweight, bedraggled, cold and starving "Hungry Harry (HH)". My discovery of HH was late on Saturday evening 18th August. By Sunday morning HH was almost gone. I managed to buy some meal worms and then for the next ten days I fed HH every hour during the hours of daylight. Raising a helpless swallow chick from hatchling to flight was a full time task. There was little thanks; prising HH's beak open to insert the tasty end of each meal worm was difficult enough without HH's efforts to resist. How could such a small bird swallow so many worms at a sitting (or prising)? But feed he did. I didn't think any further than getting him to flight. No thought about "and then what do you do?"

HH took to the wing. He flew around, then came back to perch just out of reach, so no longer could I feed him – he was a teenager - on his own!!!...

At just the right moment an adult swallow appeared to take HH under his/her wing and started to feed HH where he was sat on the stable door. Occasional feeds developed into every three/five minutes. HH thrived.

Over the next month I think we saw HH in flight with attendant adult, and HH being fed during flight. HH came back each night to roost with the other young swallows, his noticeable yellow gape beak gradually disappeared as he matured and grew. At sixty seven I am so proud and grateful to have had my own HH. How many of us can say they have directly affected a small defenceless creature in a life saving manner? Then the penny dropped.

As a Father, Grandfather and Great Grandfather I have become too far removed to remember the intensity of child rearing. The worry, the sleeplessness, the indecision, the "winging" it when we do not know what else to do. HH was my summer child (albeit only for a couple of months) you parents out there do it everyday and night and it's hard and your own HH does not always respond in an appreciative manner. You do it because of love, and you do a great job.

At Patricia Pilgrim we cannot replace you or your love, but we can have a good go at it during the times you leave your HH with us. Then just like HH, nursery children at Patricia Pilgrim fly away to do great things and discover the outside world.

It's called growing up.

A few words from manager Stephanie Barry.....



It's amazing we are already in the autumn term, where did the summer go.

This term is always very busy with many changes to the outside environment and also festivals for the children to experience and discuss.

On top of this, the government has a revised Early Years Foundation Stage to introduce to all early years settings. This curriculum will be familiar to some of you as there have only been a few noticeable changes from the old curriculum.

We now have three prime areas which concentrate on all children:

Language development
Personal, Social and Emotional development
Physical development.

There are also four specific areas which will strengthen and support the prime areas.

Literacy
Mathematics
Understanding of the World
Expressive arts and Design.

The nursery practitioners will consider their key children's individual needs, interests and stages of development and will plan activities to support their learning.



Included with the newsletter is an information pack to help you understand the framework. If you have any questions please don't hesitate to ask.

One of the new requirements we are asked to do is to formally assess all children between the ages of 2-3 years. We will complete a progress report for these children which we will share and discuss with you. This report is for you to share with your health visitor at your child's 2 year health check. The aim of the check is to review the child's development in the 3 prime areas, to enable the parents to have an understanding of their child's needs and any support the child may require. As the timing of this report is crucial we ask you to let us know when your child's development check is booked so we have the report ready for you in time for your meeting.

Just to keep you up to date with my progress at university. I have now completed my Foundation degree in child care and education and am now completing my BA. At the same time I am working towards my Early Years Professional Status. I will now be absent from nursery on a Tuesday and occasionally on a Wednesday but there are only 5 of these sessions over the year.

Under 2's - Monday 17th December between 9.30 – 12.30pm.

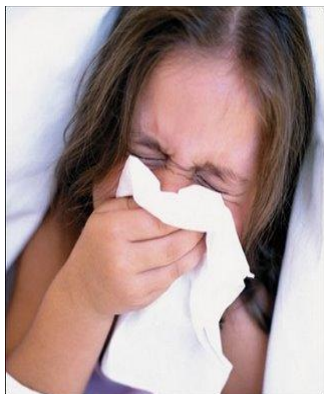
All children are welcome even when they are not booked in for the session. If you would like your child to attend please let Terri or Tracey know so we can make sure we have enough staff available. Thank you.

Sickness

Colds / flu / diarrhoea / vomiting

If your child is unwell please don't bring them into nursery to infect all the other children!

If your child has diarrhoea or sickness, please don't forget that they must be away for at **least 48 hours** from their last bout.

Also, your child must be off for 24 hours from the start of any antibiotics or eye drops.

Also we cannot give any unlicensed medicines e.g. cough medicine.

Opening and Closing

Please bring your child into nursery at the start of their session (not before) and pick them up promptly at the end. This is so we have sufficient staff available to care for your child.

Don't forget - **late pick-ups and early drop offs will be charged!**

Full day 8am – 6pm

School Day 9.00am - 3.30pm

AM session 9.00am - 12.30pm

PM session 1.30pm - 5.00pm

Cold Winter days

If we should have any snow please remember to either check the nursery web site or listen to BBC Essex radio for an announcement or contact the nursery direct to see if we are opening. Not only do you have to venture out, but we must make sure that our staff can also get to the nursery as not all of them live locally.

However, even if we have a mild winter when days look bright and sunny, it can still get very cold - so please do remember that all the children still need

to wrap up for garden play – coats, hats, gloves, scarves and Wellingtons and rain weather coats etc.

Please ensure all clothing and belongings are labeled to avoid confusion and losses. Thank you.

I am continuing with the rotating timetable and have put up on the door to the classroom what week we are on and what day we will be doing P.E.

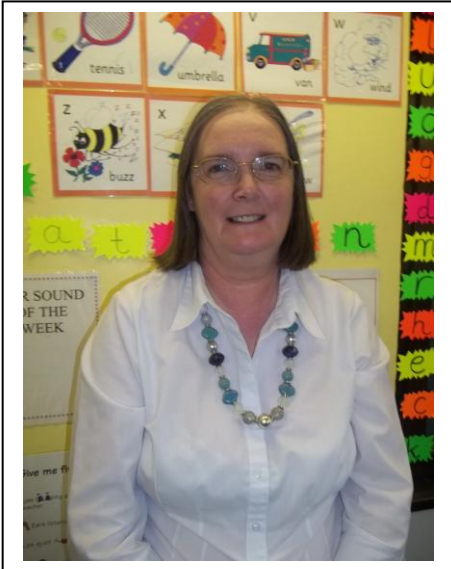
Please don't forget to look in their little red books for my comments about the activities and how well the children have been doing.

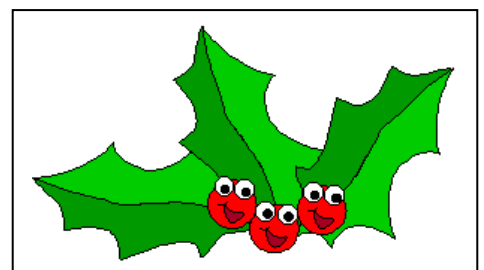

It's so nice to see all of the children becoming settled into their new rooms and getting used to their new key people. The children seem to be making great friendships and becoming more confident in so many ways.

As it seems our sunny days are getting shorter now, and the autumn is upon us, we are enjoying all of the special things that this time of the year brings such as finding a new sprinkling of conkers under our horse chestnut tree each day, playing in puddles and picking the last from our crop of courgettes, which I must say have been very fruitful this year, as were the potato plants and the carrots! I am also pleased to add that no longer do we hear "but I don't like *Cucumber*" at

the dinner table when a beautifully fresh and green *courgette* is placed on the children's plate.

Child Comforters
